



South Andaman District Administration orders strict implementation of COVID appropriate behaviours & lockdown restrictions with fines

- ❑ Persons without valid e-passes and found roaming /violating lockdown protocols will be fined Rs. 500/- along with impounding of vehicles
- ❑ Movement of materials in vehicles without valid e-passes to be fined with Rs. 5000/-
- ❑ Fine of Rs. 5000/- on Auto/Taxi plying with more than 2 passengers
- ❑ Misusing of e-passes /movement permit will attract a fine of Rs. 2000/-

Port Blair, June 17

The South Andaman District Administration has ordered strict compliance of the COVID appropriate behaviours and strict implementation of lockdown restrictions in the District. In an order issued today, Shri Suneel Anchipaka, District Magistrate, South Andaman District in pursuance of powers vested u/s 51(b) of the Disaster Management Act, 2005 has directed that persons without valid e-pass and found roaming/violating the lockdown protocols in the timings other than fixed for opening of shops (6 am to 10 am) shall be liable to be fined to the tune of Rs.500/- and the vehicle in which the person is travelling shall be impounded.

The Order further states that movement of materials in vehicles without valid e-passes in the timings other than fixed for opening of shops shall be liable to be fined to the tune of Rs.5000/- and the vehicle in which the

materials are being carried shall be impounded.

Any person found misusing the e-passes/movement permit shall be liable to be fined to the tune of Rs.2,000/- and also resulting in impounding of the vehicle in which the person is travelling.

Auto/Taxi plying with more than 2 passengers shall be liable to be fined to the tune of Rs.5,000/- and also resulting in impounding of the said vehicle.

The Order has come into effect from today (June 17) and shall remain in force till lockdown. All Sub-Divisional Magistrates, Executive Magistrates, Revenue Officials of the rank of Patwari and Police personnel of the rank of the Constable and above have been authorized to impose and collect fines as mentioned above. However, this does not bar any other legal action that may be attracted due to violation of any other Act/Law/Rule in force, the Order issued by DM (SA) added.

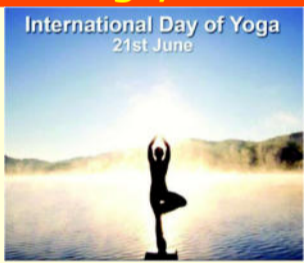

Foremost priority of Administration is to save precious lives No one will be spared, if any violations are found; cautions DC

Port Blair, June 17

The Deputy Commissioner, South Andaman, Shri Suneel Anchipaka addressing the media persons on COVID-19 status in the Islands held in the conference hall of IP&T here today said that the foremost priority of the A&N Administration is to save the precious lives of general public from this pandemic. He said that to contain the spread of the virus and bring the COVID cases status back to zero once again in A&N Islands, all the stakeholders including doctors, paramedical staff, police, senior Officers of A&N



Administration and others are working tirelessly. He cautioned that for the last two days so many violations were found and it reflects that people are not serious about the situation. He sternly warned that no one will be spared if any violations are found and the vehicles will be impounded and hefty penalty will be levied.

The Deputy Commissioner opined that people's co-operation is needed and appealed to the general public to understand the severity of this virus and follow all COVID protocols and COVID appropriate behaviors. The Deputy Commissioner mentioned

that people should restrict inter-Island movement so that we can contain the spread of the virus. Referring to the number of cases detected in Little Andaman, the Deputy Commissioner said, despite repeated requests, to report on any of the symptoms, the residents of Little Andaman who had cough, fever etc. did not come forward for medical check-up. This, he said, has contributed towards the sudden increase in the positive cases there. He said keeping in mind the safety of the residents of southern group of Islands, the public representatives and others should avoid (Contd. on last page)

The safety of the citizens is the foremost priority of the Administration, especially during this pandemic time. To shield its citizens from the corona virus, the vaccination of eligible beneficiaries is being initiated by the Administration in different parts of the Islands. Accordingly, the vaccination began with administering of COVISHIELD vaccine



for Health Care Workers followed by frontline workers and vulnerable population with comorbidities. Subsequently, the vaccination for 45 and above was initiated followed by 18 to 44 years which is currently underway.

16, 110 eligible people in the age group of 18 to 44 years have been vaccinated till date. A total of 1138 people were vaccinated today in A&N Islands. 677 beneficiaries were vaccinated in South Andaman District, out of which, 568 were in the age group of 18-44 years. CBSE submits evaluation criteria for Class 12 result 2021 in Supreme Court

New Delhi, June 17
The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) today released the Class 12 evaluation criteria or the final strategy through which it will assess Class 12 students in the Supreme Court.

The Class 12th result will be based on the Class 10th component (30 per cent) based on the best three performing subjects in the board exams, Class 11 component (30 per cent) will be based on the final exam and Class 12 component (40 per cent) based on unit test/mid-term/pre-board.

While hearing pleas seeking directions to cancel the Class 12th exams of the CBSE and CISCE amidst the ongoing pandemic, a bench of Justices AM Khanwilkar and Dinesh Maheshwari was told by Attorney General K K Venugopal that CBSE students who are not satisfied with the evaluation formula will be given an opportunity to take up Class 12th examination when the pandemic situation becomes conducive.

The apex Court recently, while hearing a plea regarding Class 12 board exams, had instructed the board to devise the strategy within two weeks. CBSE had formed a 12-member committee to finalize the evaluation criteria. (Source:india.gov.in)

ICC Test World Cup final between India and New Zealand to be held from today at Southampton

New Delhi, June 17
The final match of ICC Test World Cup between India and New Zealand will begin tomorrow at the Rose Bowl Stadium in Southampton, United Kingdom. The team that wins will create history by becoming the first team to lift the World Test Championship trophy.

India may not have played a Test match in England in the lead up to the World Test Championship final, unlike opponents New Zealand. However, they surely have more experience of playing at the Hampshire Bowl here than their opponents.

India have featured in two Test matches in Southampton, both against England, and although they lost both of them, the experience could hold them in good stead against the Kiwis, who have not played a single match at the venue.

This is also the first time the two teams will face each other at a neutral venue. Overall, India have a superior record against New Zealand in Test cricket. The two teams have played 59 Test matches with India winning 21 and losing 12. But 16 of India's wins have come at home, in 34 Tests.

In New Zealand, India have lost 10 and won only five of the 25 Tests they have played. While there had been sun in the lead-up to the Test, bringing smiles on the faces of Indian spinners, but rain is predicted over the next five days. (Source:india.gov.in)

sending requests for sending ships to southern group of Islands. People cutting across political parties should unite at this juncture and refrain from making such requests. People should be sensitive and serious towards this pandemic as this time the virus is changing its mutant and is not very easy to handle, he cautioned.

The Deputy Commissioner further disclosed that he along with his team and doctors will be visiting Little Andaman tomorrow (June 18) to assess the situation and medical requirements will be taken care of as per the need. A senior level Police Officer will also be deputed for strict enforcement of containment measures in the entire area of Little Andaman, he added.

The Deputy Commissioner further said that during the RT-PCR conducted on 287 incoming passengers who arrived here yesterday by flight, none of them were found positive. He further informed that 2 flights with 315 passengers arrived today and the RT-PCR reports are awaited. He also stated that during the RAT conducted on 168 passengers proceeding to N&M Andaman at Ferrargunj, 2 positive cases have been detected. He said, that today till 3 pm, 359 beneficiaries were vaccinated in South Andaman District, out of which, 318 were in the age group of 18-44 and the rest were above 45.

The Director, ANIIMS, Dr. A K Mandal disclosed that 16 COVID positive patients are presently undergoing treatment in the Hospital. Today, 4 COVID patients were discharged and 1 new patient was admitted in G.B Pant Hospital. He said, out of the 16 patients, 11 patients are on Oxygen support and no patient is on ventilator, he added.

The Deputy Director, G.B Pant Hospital, Dr. Amitabha De informed that in the three COVID Care Centres functioning in Port Blair, 1 new patient was admitted today and 2 patients were discharged. Altogether, 9 patients are presently being taken care of in these three COVID Care Centres while in COVID Care Centre Wimberlygunj, altogether, 6 patients are admitted, he added.

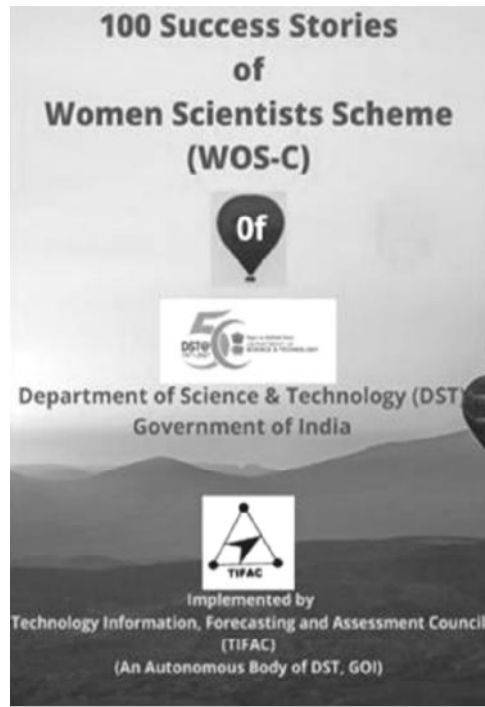

Journey of Women Scientists: From Break in Career to become Patent Professionals

New Delhi, June 17(PIB) An inspiring journey of 100 women scientists who returned to science after a break in career has been documented into a book form. The women scientists featured here had to discontinue their pursuit of career in science due to family responsibilities and social reasons. The book, which chronicles their journey to restart their career despite several obstacles, can be a beacon of light for more Indian women in similar situations. Knowledge Involvement in Research Advancement through Nurturing (KIRAN) division (now WISE-KIRAN) of the Department of Science & Technology (DST) supports women with break-in careers to return to science through the Women Scientists Scheme (WOS). Through various components of Women Scientists Scheme (WOS), DST addresses challenges confronted by those women who had a break in their career and desire to return to mainstream science. The booklet presents select stories of women who completed their training under WOS-C component of this scheme and are now achieving greater heights in their careers. Booklet contains 100 success stories of women scientist scheme trainees

which captures the lives of women who succeeded despite all odds in life. Booklet is available in both digital and print versions. I know there are many more success stories in the scheme which will be made visible to all in coming years," said Prof Ashutosh Sharma, Secretary, DST. Besides the women's journey, the book includes details like qualification, specialization, present employment status, experience, and information about technical qualification in Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) attained by each woman after completing training. WOS-C is a flagship scheme of the department and a recipient of Nari Shakti Puraskar, 2015 (Rani Lakshmi Bai Award) conferred by the Hon'ble President of India. WOS-C is implemented by TIFAC, New Delhi, an autonomous organization under DST. In the program, one-year long training is provided to women, having qualifications in science/engineering/medicine or allied areas in the field of IPRs and their management. Selection is through an All-India level online examination followed by an interview. Women between



the age ranges of 27 to 45 years can avail the benefit of this scheme. Women are trained in nuances of patent filing and prosecution as well as other patent-related work. Training has successfully developed a pool of women geared to create, protect and manage Intellectual Property in India. About 800 women have been trained in 11 batches, and about 270 women are registered Patent Agents. Many women have started their own IP firms as well and have become entrepreneurs. The scheme has made the women technically and financially confident, and many women of the middle ages who were earlier sitting at home are now beaming IP professionals.

Study explored benefits of Yoga in chronic Low Back Pain

New Delhi, June 17(PIB) Most of the yoga-based studies so far have relied on patient's experience and rating of pain and disability as an indicator of recovery and better quality of life. Researchers who measured pain, pain tolerance and body flexibility have found that yoga leads to pain relief, increases tolerance of pain and improves flexibility in patients of chronic low back pain.

Dr. Renu Bhatia, Additional Professor, Department of Physiology, AIIMS, New Delhi conducted research to measure the impact of yoga on Chronic Low Back Pain (CLBP) along with Dr Raj Kumar Yadav (Professor, Department of Physiology, AIIMS, New Delhi), Dr Sri Kumar V (Associate Professor, Department of Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation, AIIMS, New Delhi). The study conducted on 100 Chronic Low Back Pain (CLBP) patients of 50 years with 3 years of history of the disease. After systematic Yogic intervention of 4 weeks, Quantitative sensory testing (QST) showed increase in thresholds for cold pain and cold pain tolerance. Corticomotor excitability and flexibility improved significantly in the patients. They recorded objective measures for pain (electrophysiology), sensory



perception (quantitative computerized sensory testing) and cortical excitability parameters. (using Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation of motor cortex). They found significant changes between all the parameters in CLBP patients compared to healthy controls at baseline. Significant improvement in all parameters was found after yoga. This research supported by the Science and Technology of Yoga and Meditation (SATYAM) funded by the Department of Science and Technology, GoI has been recently published in the 'Journal of Medical Science and Clinical Research'. Assessment of pain and corticomotor excitability parameters shall help in establishing strong ground with scientific evidence for yoga to be prescribed as therapeutic intervention for chronic low back pain relief with or without standard

therapy depending on the pathology. Also these parameters can be used for prognosis and follow-up of patients during recovery phase. The team also developed yoga protocol for CLBP patients in Pain Research and TMS laboratory, AIIMS, New Delhi. In patients with Chronic Low Back Pain, 4 weeks of yoga intervention improved pain status and pain-related functional disability, increased spinal flexibility and corticomotor excitability significantly more than standard care. The study suggests that in long term, Yoga can be performed at home, and hence, is an inexpensive therapeutic intervention. It not only relieves pain but also improves overall quality of life and bestows other health benefits. (Contributed by Dr. Renu Bhatia, AIIMS, New Delhi)

PRESS NOTE

The Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 is an Act relating to children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law. It takes care of the basic needs of children through proper care, protection, development, treatment and social re-integration by adopting a child-friendly approach in the adjudication and disposal of matters in the best interest of children and for their rehabilitation through processes provided, and institutions and bodies established.

Department of Social Welfare, A&N Administration, invites applications from such persons who has been actively involved in health, education, or welfare activities pertaining to children for at least seven years or a practicing professional with a degree in child psychology, psychiatry, sociology or law for the following positions which are as follows:-

Composition of Juvenile Justice Board and Eligibility criteria for members is as under (refer section 4 of Juvenile Justice Act, 2015 and Rule 4 of A & N Islands Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Rules, 2017):-

- The Board shall consist of a Metropolitan Magistrate or a Judicial Magistrate of First Class having at least three years experience to be designated as the Principal Magistrate of the Board and two social worker members, of whom at least one shall be a woman, forming a Bench.
- The social worker members shall be appointed by the State Government on the recommendation of the Selection Committee constituted under Rule 87 of A&N Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Rules, 2017.
- The social worker members shall not be less than thirty five years of age and shall have at least seven years of experience of working with children in the field of education, health, or welfare activities, or should be a practicing professional with a degree in child psychology or psychiatry or sociology or in the field of law.
- As far as possible, the two social worker members so selected for a Board shall be from different fields.
- No person shall be eligible for selection as a member of the Board, if he/she -

Term of Members of the Board under Rule 5 of A & N Islands Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Rules, 2017:-

- The term of the social worker member of the Board shall not be more than for a period of three years from the date of appointment.
