Dwelling house to fisherfolk under Central Sector Scheme Two 'Model Fishermen Villages' to be established in Isles

'Model Fishermen Village' will be developed in these Islands for the betterment of the fishermen community. The Department of Fisheries is in the process of establishing two 'Model Fishermen villages' one each at Nimbutala (Rangat) and Durgapur (Diglipur) under the Central Sector Scheme titled 'National scheme for welfare of fishermen'. Altogether, 98 fishermen families have been identified for availing the benefit under this scheme. To implement the scheme, the A&N Administration has already allotted land measuring area of 3 hectares at Diglipur and 2 hectares in Nimbutala (Rangat), informed the Director of Fisheries, Shri. J. Chandrasekhar while speaking to 'The Daily Telegrams'.

The Director further informed that the component "Development of Model Fishermen Village" envisages providing basic civic amenities like houses, drinking water and a common place for recreation. Development of site and preparation of layout will be done by the Andaman Public Works Department, the Director added. APWD has been requested to submit estimates for development of land at both the sites i.e Nimbutala and Diglipur. (Contd. on last page)

PM shares his thoughts in 'Mann Ki Baat' prog. Expresses satisfaction over successful implementation of DBT scheme

New Delhi, Dec 27
Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi has expressed satisfaction over the successful implementation of Direct Benefit Transfer, DBT scheme. Addressing the nation in his 15th edition of All India Radio's Mann Ki Baat programme, Shri Modi said nearly forty thousand crore rupees have reached beneficiaries' accounts under various schemes. Noting that DBT is the largest programme of its kind in the world, Shri Modi said, 35 to 40 schemes are being included under the Direct Benefit Transfer initiative. It has found its place in Guinness Book of World Records for being the largest scheme of direct benefit transfer. He said nearly 15 crore LPG customers have already joined PAHAL, Pratyaksha Hataantari Laabh, scheme by the end of November and the subsidy is going directly in their accounts. Shri Modi said the scheme has eliminated middlemen and



plugged leakages.

The Prime Minister announced that government will unveil action plan of Start Up India, Stand Up India on 16th of January. All the youths of IITs, IIMs, central universities and other institutes will be brought together through live connectivity under the programme. He said, Start Up India, Stand Up India should spread to every corner of the country and not remain restricted to a few cities. Shri Modi also

requested state governments to take the scheme forward. He said, the scheme has a lot for the youth and asked banks to provide financial assistance to the youth to start their enterprise. Shri Modi urged the people to use Divyaang for persons with disabilities saying they are endowed with extraordinary power in certain other ways. The Prime Minister also spoke about the recently launched Accessible India programme to make transport, hospitals, school buildings, parkings and lifts disabled friendly. He recounted a phone call by Ahmedabad resident Dilip Chauhan telling the Prime Minister how he celebrated Accessible India in his school.

On the forthcoming Republic Day celebrations, Prime Minister called for launching a campaign to espouse the people to think and write something about duties which are enshrined in the Constitution. He asked students in schools and colleges and members of society to organise (Contd. on last page)

All owners of motor vehicle transporting livestock have been informed that the Central Motor Vehicles (Eleventh Amendment) Rules, 2015 regarding transport of animals will come into effect from Jan 1, 2016. In view of this, all owners of motor vehicle transporting livestock should ensure that their vehicles fulfil certain specification as per 125E Special requirement of Motor vehicles transporting livestock.



It is informed that on and after 1st January, 2016, motor vehicles used for

transportation of livestock by road shall be in accordance with the specification of the Bureau of Indian Standards as provided in IS-14904:2007; or IS5238:2001; or IS 5236:1982, as the case may be, as amended from time to time and the transporter or consigner of the livestock shall follow the code of practice laid down in the respective specification (Contd. on last page)

Australia in transition have a battle on their hands against ever-improving Indians

New Delhi, Dec 27
India visit Australia to play five ODIs and three Twenty20s in what's touted to be the battle of the heavyweights. There are many hurdles in front of the visitors but Australia, the five-time World Champions, face new challenges of their own, which has made that invincible aura at home a little less formidable. (Dhoni's Best Chance to Win a Series Down Under) For one, a certain Mr. Mitchell Starc is cooling his heels recovering from an injury. His abilities would have been an asset against a jittery Indian top-order, which has time and again succumbed to quality fast and swing bowling. India failed to beat the Australians even once last summer Down Under - losing the Tests 2-0 and not a win in the Carlton Mid ODI tri-series, involving England. Starc was not so much a force in the Tests - playing just two Tests and taking seven wickets. However, his quality came to the fore in the ODIs, ending the tri-series as the highest wicket-taker with 12 wickets in five matches,

including a haul of 6/43 against India in the first match of the tri-series in Melbourne. (India in Australia: Top 10 Memorable Contests) The Indians fortunately escaped his wrath in their next meeting against the Aussies as the rain gods came to the rescue in Sydney. However, Starc wasn't finished yet with India as he returned to haunt them in the World Cup warm-up - taking two wickets in just four overs bowled - and then again in the World Cup semi-final where he accounted for another two in his miserly eight-over spell. Then, there is the case of a youthful team under a young captain. Post the Ricky Ponting-era, Michael Clarke brought a sense of calmness to the Australian set-up and that is also evident in Steven Smith. However, there seems to be a bit of uncertainty in the Aussie line-up. There is no settled feel in this team, compared to previous Australian XIs. There are a few players like for example Shaun Marsh, who are in and out of the side.

Even the bowling has a little unsettled look to it! Mitchell Johnson - retired, Mitchell Starc - injured, Pat Cummins - injured, Peter Siddle - not played an ODI in five years. That leaves Australia really thin in the pace department with a returning James Pattinson, John Hastings, Mitchell Marsh, Josh Hazlewood and Gurinder Sandhu to maybe rely on - suddenly the task for India doesn't look so scary. It goes without saying, the Indians don't travel well, especially outside the subcontinent and the less said about their record Down Under, the better. India have played 135 matches in total in Australia, winning just 42, losing 76 and the rest being drawn or tied or no result. In the 50-over format, however, this record improves - 88 matches played, 36 wins and 46 losses - nothing to write home about but still an improvement nonetheless from the Test format.

Pakistan's Yasir Shah suspended for doping: ICC

Dubai, Dec 27
Pakistan's leg-spinner Yasir Shah was on Sunday provisionally suspended for failing a dope test by the International Cricket Council (ICC). "Shah has been charged with an anti-doping rule violation on a sample he provided in an in-competition test," an ICC statement announced. "The test, conducted on 13 November 2015, was found to contain the presence of chlorthalidone, a Prohibited Substance which appears in Section 5 of the World Anti-Doping Agency list (in the category of Specified Substances)." "In accordance with the ICC Anti-Doping Code, pending the outcome of the disciplinary process, Yasir has been provisionally suspended," said the ICC. The 29-year-old has emerged as a match-winner for Pakistan since ace spinner Saeed Ajmal's action was reported and subsequently lost his wicket-taking ability with a remodelled action.

Shiva Keshavan wins silver at Asian Championship

Nagno, Dec 27
Seasoned Indian luger Shiva Keshavan on Sunday won a silver medal at the Asian Championship which concluded here. The race consisted of two heats closely contested by athletes. Though in the first heat Shiva was a mere 2/10th of a second behind, minor technical snags cost him the gold medal in the second heat. The first place was claimed by Japan's Hidenari Kanayama, and third by Korea's Dong Hyeon Kim. "I am happy to add another medal to our kitty. This year has been extremely difficult for me financially and I am proud that despite that I have managed to keep India's flag flying in

international winter sports," he said in a press release. "I was hoping to bring home the Gold, but I still have another 2 years before Korea 2018, and am hopeful that support with come forth so I can put my best performance yet for our country," he added. Shiva will continue the season by participating in three of the remaining World Cups, all to be held in Germany. The season will end with the Homologation of the Olympic Track in Korea, where selected athletes will be able to preview and test the track there. Shiva had won two gold, a silver and two bronze medals in the previous editions of the event.

Chennai Open to debut smaller qualifying field

Chennai, Dec 27
As Chennai gets ready to kick-start the tennis season in a week's time with the 20th edition of the Chennai Open, the tournament will see the debut of a new set of rules, one of which is the reduction of the size of the qualifying draw from 32 to 16 for the ATP Tour's 250-grade events. It is a change that will affect the local players significantly. One of the stories of the 2015 edition was that of local boy Vijay Sundar Prashanth defeating higher-ranked compatriot Yuki Bhambri in qualifying to make it to the main draw of the event. Vijay Sundar said: "The decision

to reduce the field came as a shock to me. I understand where they are coming from, with a desire to finish qualifying on Saturday and Sunday and to also improve the quality of the field. "But this means there will be few surprises in the main draw of the event; it restricts a lot of players from playing in high-ranking ATP tournaments." Highlighting his own case from 2015, Vijay Sundar added: "Without a draw of 32, I would have not made the qualifying draw last year. And, now, without a wild-card for qualifying, I don't have any chances of playing the tournament this year."

Will ensure safe disposal of Union Carbide waste: Minister

Indore, Dec 27
A plan is being charted out for the safe disposal of toxic waste lying at the defunct Union Carbide factory in Bhopal, the gas leakage from where killed more than 25,000 people in December 1984, Union Minister Shri Prakash Javadekar said today. "We are working on a plan for safe disposal of the waste from the Union Carbide factory," he told reporters here on the sidelines of a function. "All precautionary measures will be taken into account to dispose of the toxic waste. All steps will be taken to resolve this problem," the Environment Minister said. Even after three decades of the world's worst industrial disaster in Bhopal, the toxic waste weighing several tonnes and lying dumped in the Union Carbide factory there, has not been disposed of. There was a plan to incinerate the dump in Dhar district's Pithampur area, but it could not happen due to protests from NGOs which fear that the disposal will cause air pollution and adversely affect the huge human settlements

around the area. Meanwhile, Shri Javadekar said that efforts are on to check the growing pollution in the country, and to improve the quality of fuel and vehicles so as to make them environment-friendly. Rules are also being made to check the dust pollution caused due to building construction work, he said,

adding that they might be put in place next month. When asked about the practicality of the Delhi government's proposed 'odd-even scheme' to put a check on the movement of cars from January 1 in order to control pollution, Shri Javadekar said he will comment on it only once the exercise starts.

Apart from this, subject to sub-rule (1), the motor vehicles for carrying animals shall have permanent partitions in the body of the vehicle so that the animals are carried individually in each partition where the size of the partition shall not be less than viz. Cows and Buffalos (2 Sq.mtrs.), Horses and Mares (2.25 mtrs.), Sheep and goats (0.3 Sq.mtrs.), Pig (0.6 Sq.mtrs.) and Poultry (40 cm sq.). No Motor vehicles meant for carrying animals shall be permitted to carry any other goods. The Regional Transport Officer shall issue special licenses for the motor vehicles meant for carrying animals on the basis of vehicles modified in accordance with the provisions of the sub-rule (2), a communication from the Registering Authority, A & N Administration said.
