Prime Minister praised chess player Vishwanathan Anand saying he always keeps his eyes fixed on the target and achieves his goal. Speaking in one segment of the programme, Vishwanathan Anand appealed to students to have good night's sleep and calm

attitude to sail through exams. Likening Chess with exams, Anand said brain recalls the right answer at the right time if the mind is calm. Laying importance on inner peace, Shri Modi recounted his own experience how deep breathing helps him cope with day to day pressures. The Prime minister laid emphasis on Yoga and how it is the key to develop the inner mind.

Vice Admiral Pradeep Kumar Chatterjee, an alumnus of the Rashtriya Indian Military College, Dehra Dun and the National Defence Academy, Pune was commissioned into the Indian Navy on 01 Jan 1977. The Flag Officer has commanded ships as well as submarines, notable among them being the Type 1500 submarines and Guided Missile Destroyer INS Rajput.

During his career, he held numerous senior Staff and Command appointments which include Commodore Commanding Submarines (West), Principal Director Submarine Operations and Principal Director Submarine Acquisition at Naval Headquarters. As a Flag Officer he has held the prestigious

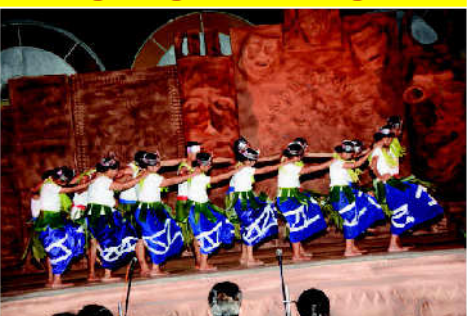

The assemblage at a seminar on 'Tribal Life and Culture' organised by the National School of Drama, New Delhi in association with Department of Art & Culture, A&N Administration today had a rare opportunity to abreast their knowledge about the age old traditions of tribes as each speakers portrayed of vivid description about tribal life and culture. The speakers with abundant knowledge about the history of tribal life of the country brought to light some lesser known facts. They also expressed concern over the dwindling population of certain tribes.

The speakers who presented their papers on different tribal



cultures and life were Shri Vasant Nigune from Madhya Pradesh, Smt. Christina Kamei from Manipur and Dr. N. Francis Xavier, Principal, JNRM.

The seminar was chaired by Shri Arjun Devcharan, Vice Chairman of National School of Drama, New Delhi.

Dwelling upon the life & culture of tribes residing in Madhya Pradesh, the first speaker of the seminar, Shri Vasant Nigune said, music is an essential part of tribal life and no tribe can live without music, art & dance. Dance is

Wawrinka claims Dubai title after 'crazy tiebreaker'

Dubai, Feb 28
Stan Wawrinka won his ninth straight final with a 6-4, 7-6 (15/13) defeat of Marcos Baghdatis to clinch the Dubai ATP title on Saturday after a "crazy tiebreaker". The French Open champion from Switzerland claimed the 13th title of his career and second of the season after Chennai, improving to 13-2 in 2016. The match lasted for almost two hours, with Wawrinka leading 4-1 in the tiebreaker but forced to go the distance as he saved five set points before winning when a Baghdatis return went wide on a fourth match point.



"Until 6-all in the tiebreak I was always up with a mini-break. I did I think two double faults and two or three, three quick mistakes," the winner said.
"Then it started to be all about nerves - 6-6, 7-7, 10-10. You try to stay there, try to play simple, aggressive. It was good to finish it in two sets."
The 30-year-old came to the emirate as second seed having not played the tournament in eight years and without a match win until getting through the first round.
"It's an amazing end of week, for

sure. It was a tough beginning, but I was always trying to fight, always trying to improve day by day even if I wasn't playing great at the beginning," Wawrinka said. "I'm really happy to have another trophy. It's an amazing feeling, especially today as I was playing some really good tennis. It was a tough final."
He added: "This was my best match of the week, I'm happy with my level today. I had to fight until

the end - it was a quite crazy tiebreaker." Wawrinka, the world number four, lost his last final in June, 2013 at the grasscourt event at 's-Hertogenbosch in the Netherlands. "I've had a great run at finals. When I get to them I really want to win. You are carrying a lot of confidence from during the week," he said. "I've always wanted to come back to Dubai, I was last here a long time ago. I lifted my level during

the week and improved every day." Wawrinka had to fight through the growing tension in what became one of the tightest finishes in the event's 24-year-history. Baghdatis now stands 0-5 in finals since winning his last title at Sydney in 2010. The Cypriot has now lost all six times he has faced Wawrinka.

Rana wins gold in 50km race walk in National Championships

Jaipur, Feb 28

London Olympian Basant Bahadur Singh Rana clinched the gold medal in men's 50km race walk event on the second and final day of the National Championships in Jaipur on Sunday.

Delhi walker Rana clocked 4 hours seven minutes 24 seconds to finish first but he must have been disappointed as he could not touch the revised Olympics qualification time of 4:06:00 on a fast Jaipur course which on Saturday saw as many as seven men's 20km race walkers breached Rio Games cut-off mark. The 32-year-old Rana has a personal best of 3:56:48 which he clocked at in the 2012 London Olympics, which was a national record then.

Uttarakhand's Chandan Singh, who has already achieved Rio qualification mark in men's 20km event, finished second with a time of 4:09:50 while Jitender Singh Rathore of Rajasthan took the bronze medal in 4:12:10.

"So effectively, in a way it means that they are umpiring with only one ear and the other ear is stuck with an earpiece." Dhoni queried whether earpieces were always necessary, suggesting they were affecting umpires' hearing.
