## PM Narendra Modi gives Gurumantra "smile more and score more" to students

New Delhi, Jan 29

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi today asked students and parents to take examinations as a festival and not be under stress. Addressing the nation in his Mann Ki Baat programme on All India Radio, the Prime Minister gave the slogan of Smile More and Score More, saying a happy student scores more marks. He said, a relaxed attitude will enable a student to recall all that he has learnt in the exam hall. He stressed that a happy mind is the secret for a good mark sheet as relaxation is the medicine for memory recall.

Shri Modi also said, exams are not a matter of life and death and it is not a benchmark to gauge success. Saying that the first couple of months are the time for exams of students, the Prime Minister observed that a tense atmosphere prevails in the entire family.

Giving the example of former President Dr. A P J Abdul Kalam who failed in his Air Force recruitment exam, Shri Modi said, if Dr. Kalam would have given up after his failed attempt, the nation would not have got such a big scientist and inspiring President.

Replying to a query sent by a listener, Shri Modi said, gaining knowledge is far more potent than getting high scores. He said, life is a proper coordination between sense of mission and sense of ambition. He said, instead of running after marks, students should gain knowledge, skill, and develop their self confidence and determination. He said, no one seeks to know the marks of a family doctor or lawyer and spelled out that it is the experience which ultimately counts.

In A & N Islands more than 26795 children in the age group of 0-5 years were administered Polio vaccine on 1st day, which includes Port Blair area 5677 children and 836 children in Defence area. Total 95.28 % has been covered on 1st day, which will be followed by two days house to house visit

on 30th and 31st January, 2017. Private practitioners of these Islands also actively participated in making the Pulse Polio Immunization a grand success, a communication from the Dy. Director (Health) said here today.

Leprosy is a common disease. It is caused by bacteria called Lepra bacilli. It is not contagious and treatment is freely available at all government hospitals and health facilities.

If Leprosy is identified and diagnosed early then it is completely curable and physical disfigurement can be prevented. The duration of treatment is either six or twelve months.

The early signs and symptoms of leprosy are:

1. Hypo-pigmented skin patches: One or more than one patch on the skin with loss of sensation, painless, pale and dry.
2. Loss of eye-lashes, nodules over ear and ear pinna and face having oily skin.
3. Hand and feet having dryness. Loss of sensation, and muscle wasting

MDT is cure for leprosy. Do not discriminate the person affected by Leprosy. Please give place to person affected by Leprosy in family and society and let him/her lead a normal life.

In our district many leprosy cases have been cured.

I therefore appeal to all of you to cooperate in this awareness campaign. If you find any person with skin patches as mentioned in the aforesaid message, contact ASHA, Anganwadi worker or health worker and get the person examined.

**Roger Federer beats Rafael Nadal in five-set thriller to clinch record-extending 18th Grand Slam**

Melbourne, Jan 29  
Roger Federer was in tears as he won a thrilling, five-set Australian Open final against his great rival Rafael Nadal to clinch a record-extending 18th Grand Slam title on Sunday. Federer won 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 3-6, 6-3 in three hours 38 minutes on Rod Laver Arena to move four major titles ahead of Nadal and Pete Sampras on the all-time winners' list. The Swiss marvel also became the oldest man in the post-1968 Open era to win a major final since Australia's Ken Rosewall at the 1972 Australian Open. It was Federer's fifth Australian title in his sixth final, and ended a long, seven-year wait to win again in Melbourne after his 2010 triumph over Andy Murray. It was the 35th meeting between the two great rivals with Nadal now leading 23-12 and 6-3 in major finals, including his five-set win over

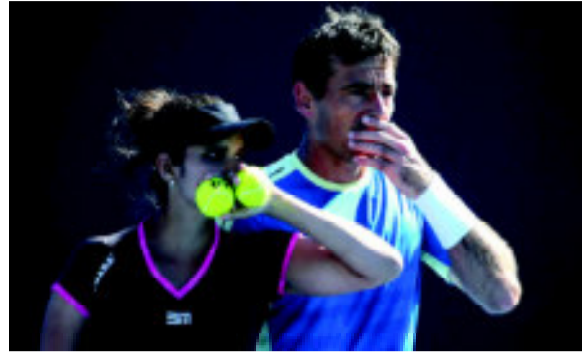


Federer in the 2009 Australian final. Federer, playing with a flatter backhand than normal, took the match to Nadal and got the only service break to take the opening set. Nadal fought back with two breaks to level before Federer got the bit between his teeth with a double break in the third set. The Spaniard hit back in the fourth set with a service break in the fourth game to take the final into a fifth set.

He again broke the Swiss early in the final set but Federer rose to the occasion and broke Nadal twice to win a classic encounter as he served out for a strong win, jumping for joy as he did so and quickly tearing up. Federer also becomes the first man in history to win five or more titles at three different Grand Slam events. He has won five Australian Opens, seven Wimbledon, five US Opens and one French Open.

**Sania Mirza-Ivan Dodig stunned by Abigail Spears and Juan Sebastian Cabal**

Melbourne, Jan 29  
Sania Mirza will have to wait for her seventh Grand Slam trophy as the Indian and her Croatian partner Ivan Dodig lost the Australian Open mixed doubles final 2-6 4-6 to underdogs Abigail Spears and Juan Sebastian Cabal, here today. The second-seeded Indo-Croatian pair paid the price for the free-flowing unforced errors from the racquet of Dodig, who struggled with his serve and groundstrokes today. It is second runners-up finish for Sania and Dodig together after losing the final of the 2016 French Open to Leander Paes and Martina Hingis. Sania had won her first ever Grand Slam at the Australian Open only when she won the mixed doubles with compatriot Mahesh Bhupathi in 2009 and the last of her three women's doubles Major trophies also came here last year with Martina Hingis. After losing the first two points, Dodig served a double fault at 30-30 and then sent a forehand long to concede a break in the very first game of the match. Cabal and Spears though



were in tremendous touch from the word go. Both were terrific from the back and at the net too. Sania was also broken in the third game. It was Cabal's brilliant volley pick up which he

placed well beyond the two players to earn a break point. Spears smashed a backhand service return winner to take the break as the second seeds trailed 0-3.

**Big Bash League: Twenty20 event smashes viewership records of all time**

Sydney, Jan 29  
Records have tumbled for the Twenty20 Big Bash League, with Cricket Australia saying Sunday the enormous crowds and viewership for the fast-paced format this season has surpassed expectations. The Big Bash is in its sixth season and has used a blend of sport and entertainment to draw families and younger spectators to games. The high-octane format has proved popular, with more than one million people attending this season's games at an average

of 30,114 per match, CA said. "Once again, fans have well and truly spoken and we couldn't be happier with how this year's competition has progressed on all levels," Big Bash chief Anthony Everard said in a statement. "The season has well and truly exceeded our expectations". The league concluded on Saturday, with a sold-out crowd at the WACA Ground in Perth watching as the Perth Scorchers thrashed the Sydney Sixers by nine wickets to win the final.

**Mick Schumacher wins in MRF Challenge at BIC**

New Delhi, Jan 29  
Mick Schumacher continued his fine form from practice and qualifying to win the opening race of Round 3 of the MRF Challenge 2016 at Buddh International Circuit in Greater Noida. Schumacher won ahead of Felipe Drugovich and Harrison Newey. In Race 2 championship leader Joey Mawson extended his lead at the front with a convincing win in an action packed race. Estonian driver Ralf Aron finished in 2nd place ahead of Schumacher, who fought back from 8th on the grid. The

opening race of the MRF 1600 championship saw pole sitter Ananth Shanmugam winning ahead of Anindith Reddy and Nayan Chatterjee. Schumacher took his maiden pole in the championship after an intense battle with Newey. The 30 minute qualifying session saw Schumacher and Newey trade fastest laps before Schumacher did a 1:50.749 to seal the top spot, making it the fastest lap ever done by the F2000 at the BIC. Starting on pole, the German driver got the perfect getaway to lead into the first corner, with front-row

starter Harrison Newey losing out to Felipe Drugovich going into Turn 1. Drugovich started to apply pressure on Schumacher but could never get close enough to attempt a pass. Behind him, Newey and Mawson was all over the rear of Drugovich but could not find a way past. Schumacher managed to control the pace at the front to take his third win of the season. Drugovich finished ahead of Newey and Mawson. Rinus van Kalmthout equalled his best result of the season finishing fifth, ahead of Kimi Schramm and Aron.

ban on tobacco products with effect from Oct. 2, 2016. Similarly, excessive consumption of alcohol is causing many health hazards and the Administration has decided to curb the consumption of liquor in the Islands. As a step towards this direction, Lt. Governor said the Administration has increased the number of dry days to 15 days on national holidays and reduced the bar timing to 6 hours. The Lt. Governor said the Administration is making all out effort in tackling such social evils by forming a Directorate of Prohibition, wherein intensive awareness and symposiums on ill-effects of tobacco and alcohol are being created among school, colleges students, youths and the general public at large. Similarly, bars and shops selling liquors on national/state highways have been asked to shut down by March 31, 2017. He also appealed to all community leaders, Heads of organizations to join hands with the Administration in propagating the ill-effects of tobacco & alcohol and help create a peaceful society.

The Lt. Governor also shared his observation about the Islands, which he said, reflects cleanliness, proper implementation of laws, central govt. schemes, social security schemes are being implemented for the welfare of the Islanders besides the citizens are law abiding and they live in perfect peace and harmony.

Speaking about Health sector, the Lt. Governor stated that majority of the population of these Islands including the Govt. officials are dependent on Govt. health service. He also acknowledged some of the short comings in the health sector pertaining to non-availability of Super Specialty Services for treating Neurology, heart related ailments and orthopaedic. The Lt. Governor assured that by June 1, 2017, a Cath Lab will be inaugurated and facilities for treating heart related ailment will be made available here in the Islands. Apart from this, specialised treatment in Orthopaedic, Neurology, Nephrology and Urology Departments will be provided soon.

The Lt. Governor has appealed to all Islanders to make best use of the central govt. schemes and help these schemes reach the grass root level population as well.

In his key note address, Dr. Mohammed Salim Engineer said the symposium on 'Peace & Harmony' calls for togetherness. He highlighted about the activities of Jamaat-e-Islami Hind which is working with a mission to propagate the message of peace and humanity among mankind across the country.
